

COMMUNITY SCHOOL INSIGHT

CommUNITY Schools are present to establish essential relationships between school, parents, and the community to eliminate barriers to services and create a solid foundation for student achievement.

In 2018, the first CommUNITY School was opened at Lincoln Elementary. In 2021, a second CommUNITY School opened at the O'Connor Learning Center for the Early Childhood Education Program.

CommUNITY schools often hold events to connect families to services. Some services offered at events include dental checks, parenting classes, and immunizations. The focus at the O'Connor Learning Center is to provide education, services, supports and opportunities that lead to improved student learning, stronger families and a healthier community.



EARLY LITERACY DATA INSIGHT


Grand Island Public Schools students and staff continue to see positive results and progress as literacy efforts are championed across the district.

In fall 2020, GIPS began implementing a high-quality foundation skills program for K-2 students. In the 2021-2022 school year, more than 80 percent of Kindergarteners met the end of year benchmark in 11 GIPS classrooms. In four of those classrooms 90 percent of students met the end of year benchmark.




In fall 2021, GIPS added a supplemental piece to address phonemic awareness because our fall 2020 data suggested it was a need. Since then, we have seen significant increases in first grade students' phonemic awareness, decoding, and letter sound knowledge, which are important reading skills for students entering first grade.












MATH & SCIENCE OVERVIEW

In the 2020-2021 school year, GIPS middle school teachers rolled out new math curriculum resources. Results were immediate; while the state saw proficiency scores decrease at all grades 6th, 7th, and 8th from 2019 to 2021, GIPS middle school proficiency percentages stayed the same or increased.





GIPS Middle school teachers implemented a new science curriculum in 2017, which aligns with new state standards that were also released that year. These science standards



are more focused on problem solving and students doing science. GIPS science teachers were trained in and wrote rigorous grade-level standards-based tests for the district to provide data to make sure our students were progressing. In the 2021-2022 school year, GIPS eighth graders were 14% more proficient than in 2018, where the state only saw a 3% growth. The work teachers did, combined with the science curriculum, contributed to students' positive growth and success in science.

In January 2022, Grand Island Public

Schools implemented "Hello Hero," a zoom-based therapy service.

This counseling resource is a free referral-based service for all GIPS students, no matter their grade level.

1 430 students have used **"Hello Hero"** since its implementation at GIPS.

1,116,919 Lunches were served throughout 2021-2022.

496,135 Breakfast meals were served in 2021-2022.









COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

The Academies of Grand Island Senior High continue to focus on dual credit offerings as the district emphasizes college & career readiness opportunities for students. In the 2021-2022 school year, 662 students took 1,350 dual credit classes. Of those 662 students, 335 were seniors. These dual credit offerings give students the opportunity to earn college credit while in high school. This can help students learn at a higher level, while also saving time and money rather than taking the course in college, as college credit is offered at no charge to students.





GIPS has been a leader in implementing the state's first Registered Apprenticeship Program in 2017. Through community partnerships, the program offers students an opportunity to gain experience in a specialized area in the spring of their junior year and continue through their senior year. Registered apprenticeship areas of focus include: automotive, diesel, manufacturing, and welding. The program takes an "earn while you learn" approach, and allows students an opportunity to gain real-world experience at a local business.




ACT: Percentage of Students Proficient 21-22





COST PER PUPIL GIPS VS. STATE




