Reaching our latest graduation rate of 87.27% — the highest we have seen in these last five years — is within striking distance of our increased goal of at least 90% in our new strategic plan.

Moreover, we are proud of what that rate constitutes:

- Our Hispanic student graduation rate of 85.10% exceeded the state average by nearly 6%.
- Our English Learners graduation rate saw a 14.65% increase from the previous year.
- Students with an IEP saw an 8.77% increase as well.
- We maintained the state average of over 91% graduation rate for white students.

This shows that no matter your race, socioeconomic status, or background every student will know that they can graduate college and career ready. The picture of diversity and excellence within our schools is strong. This is what it looks like to thrive.

On behalf of the GIPS Board of Education and the entire staff, we look forward to working with you in continuing to increase the effectiveness of our invaluable influence, ensuring our students remain on track to thrive. As we aim future forward let us be bold and let us be better together.







Katelyn Hill will graduate from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln with Honors in May 2022.


Though she will graduate with an Actuarial Science degree, in fall 2022 she plans to attend graduate school at UNL in hopes of becoming a high school teacher.

### CURRENT PROJECT UPDATE

Grand Island Public Schools, Central Community College and CHI Health St. Francis are partnering on a project to provide students with specific hands-on learning experiences



and to support the need for local healthcare and emergency services workers. The unoccupied space of the 8th floor at CHI Health St. Francis will be transformed into a "school within a hospital" as the Academy of Medical Sciences plans to relocate to the renovated space. The space will include classrooms and simulator labs.

The project will be funded with community donors and partners to leverage collaboration without burdening taxpayers. GIPS has also budgeted \$1 million in the special building fund to go toward the project.
