STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

Grand Island Public Schools is now in the fourth year of a five-year strategic plan. We are proud to showcase ongoing success within each of the four main pillars of the plan as well as report a snapshot of district progress on the main objectives outlined within those pillars.



Following the Nebraska Reading Improvement Act, GIPS placed its focus on improving K-3 reading. GIPS began evaluating early literacy practices and piloted Core Knowledge Language Arts (CKLA) skills in grades K-1. Growth among kindergarteners was measured as well or better than 91 percent of similar districts. In just 22 days of instruction with CKLA, the percentage of first-grade students in the district's five pilot schools with outstanding skills jumped by 19 percent. Those with adequate skills jumped by 8 percent and those with questionable skills decreased by 27 percent.



GIPS added two full-day preschool classrooms at Howard Elementary in the fall after being awarded a \$241,672 grant through the Early Childhood Education Grant Program. This allowed us to serve an additional 30 students.



GIPS recognized that rising costs are a barrier to students being college-ready and responded. Thanks to expanding partnerships with post-secondary partners at Central Community College, Wayne State University, and the University of Nebraska at Kearney, all 59 Advanced Placement (AP) and dual credit opportunities were made freely available to students — zero cost for 100 percent of the student body.



Thanks to fantastic district partners, 141 students across all academies participated in qualified job shadow or internship experiences, and 13 were awarded registered apprenticeships through eight industry partners. More than 275 students earned industry certifications to meet workforce needs.

The Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) is a statewide assessment system given to Nebraska students in 3rd-8th grade in the areas of English Language Arts and Math. Science NSCAS assessments are given to fifth- and eighth-graders only. Data for 2019-20 is not available due to the pandemic.

CLASS OF 2020

The 564-student class of 2020 weathered unimaginable circumstances to graduate in the spring. It took commitment and courage to not let a pandemic get in the way of a monumental achievement: earning a high school diploma. Every member of the graduating class will forever hold a special place in the history of the district. As student speaker Grace Johnson said, "The unfairness we're going through isn't supposed to be easy, but it is supposed to make us stronger. It's supposed to make us better, and it's our job to learn from it."

Unfortunately, the pandemic made it unsafe for graduation to be held in person, so GIPS pivoted to ensure that the ceremony was held virtually, making it available for streaming online and on News Channel Nebraska. Streaming was also incorporated for the summer and winter graduation ceremonies.


RESPONSE TO THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The speed of the district's response matched the speed of the pandemic. When GIPS made the decision on March 15 to move to remote learning due to an increasing number of COVID-19 cases, the district acted swiftly to take care of the whole child — from feeding thousands within 24 hours to providing social-emotional resources virtually to continuing education for all.

The Nutrition Services team provided 673,396 meals from March 17 through July 28, and the district's technology infrastructure brought educational opportunities into the home of every student in the district. GIPS partnered with Verizon to purchase Jetpacks for those who needed Internet access, distributing 125 to families in an effort to ensure equity and access to all students for eLearning. GIPS released a 70-page Reimagined plan, which was recognized as a state model by Gov. Pete Ricketts and featured three education models — Reimagined, Select, and Remote — to allow the district and the students it serves to adapt as needed to ensure safety and security, continuity of learning, equity and access, and social-emotional support. A 43-member team was assembled to handle virtual learning.

A public-facing dashboard was launched and updated weekly. A pandemic team was assembled on March 6 and brought together leaders from nutrition services, facilities, finance, communication, and technology. Athletics and activities continued through the spring, summer, and fall seasons. Summer learning opportunities were provided virtually.

CARES ACT FUNDING



Faculty and students abided by mask and social-distance protocols and supported fluctuating quarantine measures. The district secured \$2.1 million in CARES Act funding, the majority of which went toward covering transportation costs. GIPS built upon what was learned and let data direct its decision-making.







Early Childhood Social Worker, Child Saving Institute

Yosivel Alvarado attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and majored in Child, Youth and Family Studies. After graduating in 2016, Yosivel moved back to Grand Island to work as a Family Support Worker for two years. In 2018 she moved to Omaha to work as an Early Childhood Social Worker with the Pediatric Social Services program at the Child Saving Institute.

Working for the program allows Alvarado to be placed at a pediatric clinic that serves low-income populations. She then receives referrals to work one-on-one with families who need extra support or parent education outside of the clinic. Alvarado is currently working to complete her Master's degree in social work at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

"The social work field is a highstress level field, but at the same time it's extremely rewarding," she said. "I love being able to be a support to many families through difficult or stressful times. Social work is vital to the community and really ensures that families with barriers are getting their concerns and needs addressed."

Growing up in the Grand Island Public Schools district helped shape Alvarado into who she is today.

"I was able to have amazing teachers and role models who helped guide me in regards to education," she said. "I will always be extremely grateful for the experiences and memories that GIPS provided me with and will treasure them always."

Josh is currently a sophomore studying business at University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He is involved with the UNL Business Honors Academy, Clifton Strengths Institute, and Cru. He currently plans to earn a degree with an accounting major along with a finance minor. In addition to being a full-time student, Josh also works part time at Pathway Bank.

Josh said the combination of accounting and finance makes him more employable.

After high school, Devin attended a small college in Utah focused on technology sciences, where he studied Information Systems. His degree covered topics from enterprise network equipment configurations and setup to management of any server you could think of.

Devin joined Grand Island Public Schools in 2020 as an IT Technician. He is in charge of a cybersecurity program where he gets to manage the phishing awareness program.

"I love the mystery around how the technology works," he said. "A majority of our population directly interacts with technology every day, but so few understand where a message goes when you hit 'send'. For the same reason, I considered becoming a car mechanic, but technology spiked more curiosity."

During his Junior and Senior year of high school, Devin studied at the Career Pathways Institute in the Information Technology path. He said the IT path helped in cementing his choice of pursuing a career in IT.

"Through the exploratory courses taken through CPI and my internship with KDSI, I was able to build my first computer," Devin said. "Additionally, CPI helped prepare me for college courses by giving me a new perspective. I was able to ask questions in my college courses that I wouldn't have known to ask if college was my first exposure to IT."


